



# **About Kijana Kwanza (Young People First)**

Founded in 2019, Kijana Kwanza supports the most **vulnerable children and young people**, in particular those who have been orphaned, abandoned or at risk, by providing them with a safe and stable environment in which to live, grow, stay healthy, access **education** or **vocational training** and gain essential **life skills**.

Our goal is to empower a new generation of Tanzanians to become **engaged**, **globally aware** and **financially independent** citizens with the means to become change-makers in their own communities and the country at large.

Nearly 5 years on, the charity, alongside its partners, operates services from 8 different locations across Kilimanjaro Region, employs 25 staff, sponsors over 200 students and benefits nearly 10,000 children, young people and their families in the wider community each year.

Until recently, Kijana Kwanza has primarily focused on supporting children and young people aged 13-25 years. **Halima Children's Home** represents a **major expansion** of our work in supporting a new age demographic of 5-12 years, whilst challenging **outdated** modes of child welfare provision in Tanzania, and the developing world in general.

### **The Problem**

There are an estimated **1,300,000** orphans and **437,000** street children in Tanzania.

As a result, legally registered orphanages and children's homes are **severely overcrowded** and struggling to absorb the numbers.

This has led to the proliferation of unregistered establishments where vulnerable children live in squalor and are often subject to exploitation and abuse.



# **Background: Who was Halima Selengia?**

Halima Selengia was a **founding member** of the Moshi Branch of the **Tanganyika African National Union (TANU)**. Set up in 1954, it was the principle political party in the struggle for sovereignty of the East African state of Tanganyika (now Tanzania).

Due to Selengia's activism, the Moshi Branch of TANU was dominated by women traders who contributed financially to the independence movement. On a visit to Kilimanjaro Region, Mwalimu Julius Nyerere, the founding father of modern Tanzania, resided at Halima Selengia's home.

In her final years, Halima Selengia **opened her home** to provide and care for orphaned children in the community. She died at the ripe age of **94 years**.

After her death, community members **continued her legacy** by caring for orphans, in the same property, establishing **Halima Orphanage**.



# **Eviction of Halima Orphanage**

In April 2023, following a **dispute** between the heirs of **Halima Selengia**, the premises occupied by the orphanage, were, without warning, **repossessed by court order**.

Twenty children returned from school, to find their home **bolted shut** and bailiffs casting **their few possessions** into **dump trucks** stationed on the curb side.





Kijana Kwanza responded to the emergency immediately, arriving on the scene to salvage any remaining property and furniture. Despite limited bed capacity, the children were taken into our shelter, following a formal request by Moshi Municipality.

Kijana Kwanza has now taken over management of Halima Orphanage. The children currently reside in a renovated rented property with qualified staff overseeing their care. Whilst the older children have moved to Kariwa Shelter, which is more suitable for teenagers, they have been replaced by other primary school children, rescued from abandonment, abuse and neglect.



# **Project Aims**

### Halima Children's Home will:

- Rescue and provide emergency shelter for up to 120 children aged 5-12 years, at any one time, who have been orphaned, abandoned or subject to neglect or abuse.
- 2. Meet both the immediate and long-term physical, mental, emotional and social needs of vulnerable children including healthcare, quality schooling, and recreational activities.
- 3. Support family reunification, where possible, to avoid institutionalising children for the full duration of their childhood.



- 4. **Train** new foster parents to provide long-term community-based placements for children without family to care for them.
- **5. Develop** neighbourly support networks that enrich the lives of children and create stable families.

## **Project Values**

### Child First Approach:

We will prioritise the needs of children above all else, and involve them, where possible, in all decisions that affect them and their futures.

### Community Based Care:

We will restrict institutional care to emergencies and short-term interventions, encouraging long-term support from within the community.

### Culturally Sensitive:

We will ensure that our model of child upbringing and fostering reflects the Tanzanian tradition of local people cooperating and working together to provide for the essentials and basics of good living.

### Holistic Community Development:

We will seek to transform the lives of vulnerable children by making long-term investments in families and communities to challenge ingrained, structural inequalities in society.

## What is Community-Based Care?

**Rescued children** who have been transferred for long-term care in the community, will be provided with:

- School fees and all related education costs
- A monthly care package of food and toiletries
- Medical insurance
- Clothing and other personal items
- Access to weekend extra-curricular activities and regular community events at Halima Children's Home
- Pocket money deposited into a child savings account, which can be accessed after the child reaches the age of 18 years

#### Foster Families will receive:

- Regular training on child development and parenting skills
- Scheduled and surprise safeguarding visits from a social worker
- A monthly payment for the care of the child





# Safeguarding

Protecting children from abuse and neglect is our number one priority.

All **staff and foster parents** will be required to:

- Undertake a criminal record check via local police
- Attend safeguarding training to understand the rights of children and their duties and responsibilities to children in care
- Report any concerns related to the welfare of a child to our local Safeguarding Officer as a condition of employment

Children will be provided with:

- Age-appropriate training in safeguarding
- Guidance on how to report any worries or concerns
- Access to a qualified Social Worker on-call 24/7



# **Project Management**
